Vote in the Elections Show the student administration how popular these clubs are by voting in the new Boards online in April (date TBA).



What is the Board of Directors?

The Board of Directors are elected by the membership (York students), or they are appointed by a current Board.

The Board focuses on the long-term well being of the organization, makes all major financial decisions, and acts as the employer for organization staff.

The Board also makes decisions about things like trainings, yearly budget, direction of planning and programming, the hiring of staff, and the allocation of funds and resources to support campaigns, and events.

What does it take to be on the Board?

- make a commitment of around 4 6 hours per week; this includes regular meetings (the group will decide if these will be on Zoom, in person, or hybrid)
- be on top of your emails (checking every 24-48hrs)
- Uphold the CWTP/SASSL mandate, policies, and procedures
- be committed to learning about and confronting the many forms of oppression
- be passionate about social justice, and liberation for women and trans people
- be willing to work cooperatively with staff, other Board members, and volunteers
- have an interest in understanding how non-profits work, including staff/ employer relations, policies and finances
- Have a desire to develop new skills, and get to know new people
- You may be faced with challenges from the bureaucratic structures, so strong advocacy skills are an asset

Why join the board?

As a board member you will receive training in things like:

- the financial management and governance of a non-profit organization
- how to facilitate and participate in meetings
- collective decision-making and group process
- how to be an employer in a unionized workplace

The skills that you will learn as a Board member will be a major asset to you in other organizations, and this experience looks great on a resume! You will make friends with like-minded people, and gain confidence in leadership roles.
